NJ Clean Energy Program Provides Energy Efficient Light Bulbs

Income-eligible Plainsboro residents recently received energy efficient light bulbs courtesy of New Jersey's Clean Energy Program through the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities. These light bulbs use 70% to 95% less energy and last at least 15 times longer than traditional incandescent bulbs, resulting in an estimated savings of \$55 in electricity costs over the lifetime of the bulb. The program encourages residents to replace traditional incandescent, halogen and CFL bulbs with LED throughout the household to save money and energy.

Did you know that sidewalk maintenance and repairs are the responsibility of the owner, occupant or tenant? Residents often ask who is responsible to maintain or repair sidewalks located adjacent to a home or business. Per township ordinance, the owner, occupant or tenant of the premises abutting or bordering any street in the Township shall repair and maintain the abutting sidewalks of such streets in accordance with the standards on file in the Department of Planning & Zoning.

Did you know that work continues at the PSE&G Dey Road substation?

Construction trailers and most of the exterior work for the new PSE&G substation on Dey Road is complete.

Work continues on the interior, connecting all of the new switch gear and testing the new equipment. Upgrades were needed to the existing substation to provide backup systems and increase performance to meet the growing demands for electricity. Landscaping and final site work will continue into the fall depending on the weather and availability of plant material.

Did you know that Middlesex County has placed an official ballot drop box at the municipal complex?

Voters who prefer to 'vote by mail' now have another method of submitting their ballot. Prior to the primary election, Middlesex County placed an official ballot drop box at the plaza of the municipal center. The box will remain in this location indefinitely, but certainly through this year's general election. As of this writing, the last day to apply for a mail in ballot for the general election (scheduled for November 2nd) is October 26th and the last date to apply for a mail in ballot in-person at the Middlesex County Clerk's Office is November 1st at 3:00pm.

Township Events Planned for Saturday, November 6th

The following events have been scheduled for Saturday, November 6th:

• The **final bulk waste day** of 2021 is scheduled from 8:00am to 5:00pm. Residents can dispose of various household items at the Plainsboro Recycling/Conservation Center located off of Grovers Mill Road. Items accepted include: white goods, bicycles, lawn mowers, furniture, wood scrap and other bulky items. Regularly recycled items are NOT accepted (cardboard, plastic bottles/cans and metal bottles/cans). Construction/demolition debris is not accepted either, but residents are allowed to dispose of small quantities of masonry and paving items. Proof of residency is required. • A **free rabies clinic** will be held at the Plainsboro Public Works garage located at 20 Woodland Drive. Dogs are scheduled for 9:00am to 10:00am and cats are scheduled for 10:00am to 11:00am. Owners must have large dogs securely leashed. Very small dogs and cats should be in a pet carrier.

• The **Annual Fall Stream Cleanup** will take place from 9:30am – 11:30 am. Everyone is welcome to join in as we clean up along the Lenape and the Millstone River Park Trails, and at the Plainsboro Preserve. We will meet at the Recreation and Cultural Center for check in. Once we check in and gather our supplies, we will divide into groups and head to our assigned cleanup areas to pick up as much garbage as we can in the allotted time.

New State Law Bans Single-Use Plastic Bags

This past November Governor Murphy signed into law a ban on single-use plastic bags. Single-use bags are made primarily from fossil fuels and are meant to be disposed of immediately after use. Stores (including retail) and food service businesses will no longer provide nor sell single-use plastic carryout bags to customers. Additionally, grocery stores larger than 2,500 square feet cannot provide nor sell single use plastic bags or paper bags. These businesses only will be able to provide or sell reusable carryout bags.

The law also prohibits food service businesses providing or selling polystyrene foam for food. The most common polystyrene foam food service products are food containers, plates, hot/cold beverage cups, meat/vegetable trays, cutlery and egg cartons. New Jersey Clean Communities, a statewide litter abatement program, provides a condensed version of the law on their website, <https://bagupnj.com>. A more thorough description is

available on the NJDEP website, <https://www.nj.gov/dep/plastic-ban-law/#faqs>.

Instead of single-use bags, New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) is recommending reusable carryout bags. A reusable carryout bag must have the following three characteristics:

- made of polypropylene fabric, PET nonwoven fabric, nylon, cloth, hemp product, or other washable fabric
- must have stitched handles
- be designed and manufactured for multiple uses

The single-use plastic bag ban is effective May 4, 2022.

“As a community Plainsboro has always been cognizant of, and taken seriously its environmental responsibilities. Using reusable carryout bags is another step in being responsible environmental stewards,” states Township Committeeman David Bander.

Having a “Virtual” Outdoor Education Experience

Having a new experience can be fun in spite of COVID-19! Typically, we plan an outdoor trip with sixth graders to the Pocono mountains with Community Middle school teachers and Recreation Senior Park Ranger Craig Harley. Unfortunately, COVID-19 put an end to those usual plans.

However, an idea was sprung! “We just knew we wanted to provide an educational experience and get the kids as close to nature as we could, given the circumstances”, said Harley.

Over a two-week period, teachers from Community Middle school joined the Township creating a two-week “virtual” outdoor education experience by showing video and audio from smart phones and tablets touring and presenting on everything from the 17-year cicada emergence to beaver habitat in the Plainsboro Preserve to invasive species.

“Although nothing beats getting outside, we were able to virtually engage and have a learning experience with over 300 middle school students,” said Committeeman Nuran Nabi.

2021-2022 Plainsboro Preserve Deer Management Program

Plainsboro Township will continue the annual deer hunt at the Plainsboro Preserve during the 2021-2022 season beginning September 11, 2021. This is the fourth year for this program. The managed hunt is intended to reduce the deer population to minimize widespread vegetation damage to the Plainsboro Preserve and the surrounding environs. The deer harvest program

Make Life Easier Through Online or Electronic Tax Payments



ONLINE PAYMENTS

Plainsboro Township accepts online payments and preauthorized automatic debits for property tax payments.

To make an online payment, visit www.plainsboronj.com and click on the Online Payments icon (pictured left). Choose the option "Taxes" and follow the prompts. You can access your tax bill using your name, your address or your block and lot. Payments by credit card or e-check are accepted. A vendor service charge of \$1.95 per transaction is included when paying by e-check. Payment by credit card includes a service charge of 2.95% of balance paid. This service charge is 100% payable to the credit card provider.

For a no-cost electronic option, Automatic Clearing House (ACH) payment is also available. Register with the Tax Collector's office and your preauthorized bank account will be debited each quarter for the amount due on your block and lot. This option is very popular because it's free and you essentially "set it and forget it" when it comes to remembering to pay your quarterly property taxes. Email reminders are sent prior to payments being debited from the preauthorized bank account.

"An added benefit to utilizing bike patrols is that they run on human power rather than gas, so their carbon footprint is much smaller than that of a patrol car", stated Deputy Mayor Neil Lewis.

Pet Licenses: New Jersey State law mandates that all dogs six months of age or older be licensed. Applications are available for all new pets in the Township Clerk's Office at 641 Plainsboro Road. Proof of rabies vaccination must be submitted with the application. **According to state regulation, when licensing, the rabies vaccination immunity must extend through at least ten (10) months of the 12-month licensing period.** Therefore, licenses cannot be issued if the rabies vaccination expires before November 1st of each year. If for any medical reason the animal cannot be vaccinated in the required time, form VPH-28 must be completed by the veterinarian and submitted with the form. Submit a copy of the spay/neuter certificate, if applicable. The license fees are \$13.20 for spayed/neutered animals and \$16.20 for non-neutered animals. Late fees of \$5.00 per month are assessed as of February 1st.

Vital Records: The local registrar is responsible for maintaining vital records of births, marriages/civil unions, domestic partnerships and deaths that occurred in Plainsboro Township. The municipality that holds the original record is the only registrar, besides the State Registrar, that can issue a certified copy.

A Certified Copy of a vital record is issued to those individuals who have a direct link to the individual(s) named on the vital record, as identified in the Governor's Executive Order 18, and provided that the requestor is able to identify the vital record and can provide proof of his identity and relationship.

Brush Collection Schedule/Guidelines:

In Section 1, brush will be collected in April, June, August and October. In Section 2, brush will be collected in March, May, July and September. Brush must be curbside by 7:00am on the first Monday of the month designated for your section ONLY. Brush left curbside during non-scheduled months is subject to fines and removal costs. When using this service, please follow these guidelines:

- Stack brush lengthwise at curbside between sidewalk and curb. Do not place brush in the street or within 10' of any catch basin.
- Brush cannot exceed 6 feet in length or 5 inches in diameter.
- No roots, stumps, soil, tree logs, grass or any other debris.

Leaf Collection Schedule/Guidelines – Dates are Only Estimates-Residents will receive at least two collections

In Section 1, leaves are scheduled for collection from October 12th through October 22nd and again from November 8th through November 24th (weather permitting). In Section 2, leaves are scheduled for collection from October 25th through November 5th and again from November 29th through December 10th (weather permitting). Leaves must be curbside for collection no earlier than seven (7) days prior to the scheduled pickup date. When using this service, please follow these guidelines:

- Leaves should be raked to the curb, no closer than ten (10) feet from storm drain inlet and must be free of debris.
- Leaves that are mixed with grass, branches, soil, etc. will not be picked up.

Residents not wishing to wait for their scheduled collection date can bring their brush/leaves to the conservation center during normal operating hours.
